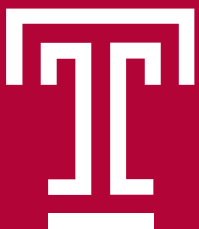

Financial Aid First Steps: FAFSA

All U.S. citizens and eligible non-citizens seeking aid must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). **If you apply by March 1—Temple's priority deadline**—you will be considered for the following financial aid.

- Federal Pell Grant
- Pennsylvania State Grant (If you're a PA resident)
- Temple University Grant
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant
- Federal Direct Loan
- Federal Work-Study

Temple's FAFSA code is **003371**.





Financial Aid Types

SCHOLARSHIPS

Funds are yours—you don't have to pay them back. Scholarships can be merit- or need-based. Merit awards are dependent on academic ability, and need-based awards are determined by your FAFSA. Temple automatically considers all students for merit scholarships, and everyone is encouraged to apply for scholarship funds outside the university.

GRANTS

Funds are yours—you don't have to pay them back. Applying for a federal, state or Temple grant is part of the FAFSA process. Grants are typically need-based. Temple grants are not guaranteed every year.

LOANS

Funds are borrowed—you must pay them back with interest. There are several options, such as federal Direct Loans, Parent PLUS and private lenders.

FEDERAL WORK-STUDY

You earn money at various on- or off-campus approved job opportunities. Students receive a biweekly paycheck to cover non-billable education expenses, such as books and supplies.

Scholarship Options

MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

\$1,000 to full tuition

First-year applicants* who have completed their application by Feb. 1, 2020 are eligible for merit scholarships and will be considered automatically. No separate application is required. You'll get a scholarship notification via TUportal by March 1, 2020. **To secure your scholarship funds, you must submit your tuition deposit by May 1, 2020.** The value and volume of merit scholarships we can offer is determined by the availability of funding, as well as the size, quality and characteristics of the entire applicant pool.

**For scholarship purposes, a first-year applicant is a current high school student who will graduate prior to the start of the fall 2020 semester and will not earn any college credits after their high school graduation.*

PRESIDENT'S SCHOLAR AWARD

Full tuition

Recipients of this merit-based award may also apply for one summer educational stipend of \$4,000 to be used for a variety of academic experiences, such as approved study away, research opportunities or internships.

BROAD STREET FINISH LINE SCHOLARSHIP

\$500 to \$5,000 annually

This need-based scholarship supports first-generation college students.

#YOUAREWELCOMEHERE SCHOLARSHIP \$20,000 annually

This scholarship recognizes promising international students with a vision for enhancing intercultural understanding.
